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CHRISTIAN VIRTUES AND COMMERCIALS

The cardinal virtues are four virtues that help to guide our lives with faith and reason. Cardinal is a word that means "hinge". All the other virtues hinge on these four:

- ♦ <u>Prudence</u> is the virtue that helps us to make good decisions in every circumstance. Prudence helps us to recognize the truth. Another name for prudence is "common sense."
- ♦ <u>Fortitude</u> means courage, but not in a rash or fool-hardy sense. The virtue of fortitude helps us to stand up for what is right, and even to accept suffering or ill treatment for the sake of the gospel.
- ♦ <u>Temperance</u> helps us to moderate our desires, especially our appetites for food, drink, and sex. Temperance keeps our desires within the limits of what is honorable and right.
- ♦ <u>Justice</u> is the virtue that is concerned with respecting the rights of others, with special emphasis on the rights for the poor and mistreated.
